After they called in the apostles and had them flogged, they ordered them not to speak in the name of Jesus and released them. Then they went out from the presence of the Sanhedrin, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to be treated shamefully on behalf of the Name.

-Acts 5.40-41 (CSB)



Christianity has long considered suffering as a part of the redemptive process for humanity. This is most clearly seen at the cross with Jesus. Isaiah 53 paints the picture of a suffering servant that was punished for our faults and failures (Isaiah 53. 6). When we look at the scene of the cross, we see the torment He bore. The psychological torment of false accusations. The emotional torment of being insulted by those who surrounded Him. The physical torment of scourging and being killed on

the cross. The Church has always understood that this suffering was necessary in order to appease the justice of God so that the faults of creation could be restored to the perfection God desires for it. While I understand that is hard for some people to grasp, the early church never strayed from this understanding.

It is because of this understanding that the early disciples rejoiced at their flogging. For them, this was simply a sign that God considered them worthy to be treated as His Son was. What an amazing and difficult perspective to have. Paul would reiterate this by stating that the sufferings of this present world are not worth comparing to the joy that is to come (Romans 8. 18). He would go on to state that he bears the marks of Jesus on his body (Galatians 6. 17). Paul understood that suffering in this world was temporary and could be used to gain an understanding of Christ that we do not get without suffering. Jesus even states that we should expect persecution since He was persecuted in the world as well (John 15. 18- 25).

As someone who has experienced pretty minor inconveniences, I find it difficult to connect with these concepts. There is a part of me that wants to understand suffering better. In a strange twist of reason, I was intrigued when the doctor told me I would feel like I was hit by a bus when I wake up from surgery. A part of me is truly excited. I believe that God can work all things to empower our understanding of faith and life (Romans 8. 28). That part of my brain is looking forward to drawing nearer to this idea of suffering and how it is redemptive. While I would never wish suffering upon any of God's creatures- especially a fellow human, I look forward to it myself. I have even taken note that they will pierce my side just as my Savior's side was pierced. I trust that God will speak to me so I can better speak to you about the redemptive qualities of suffering.

Therefore, my prayer is for a quick recovery, not because it will remove suffering from me, but because it will empower me to serve better. I have truly grown in my understanding of, for me to live is Christ (faithful service to God even when it is difficult) and to die is gain (after all, I get to experience Jesus face to face!) (Philippians 1. 21). I look forward to returning to faithful service for as long as God desires to use this faulty and frail body. I look forward to how God will use this experience to speak His love and grace to others. Especially, I look forward to the time when I can worship with the Church Triumphant that we will celebrate on November 7th together. In all things, may God be praised!




Sunday, November 7th




